ARC ACHIEVEMENTS

National Academy of Medicine elects Dr. Alicia Fernández to membership

The well-deserved honor is the highest recognition in American medicine. [Announcing Dr. Fernandez's membership](#), the Academy highlights Dr. Fernandez for "seminal health services research elucidating the impact of language and literacy barriers on patient outcomes and experience of care that highlights the challenges facing millions with limited English proficiency, and for effectively championing workforce diversity and health equity through high-impact research and program development."

[Dr. Alicia Fernandez](#) is a Core Faculty member of ARC for Health Equity and serves on the ARC Executive Committee. She is also a professor of medicine at UCSF, a general internist at the Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital and Trauma Center, Associate Dean of Population Health and Health Equity for the UCSF School of Medicine, and the founding Director of the UCSF [Latinx Center of Excellence](#).



Dr. Neeta Thakur's team at CLEAR Lab receives five-year grant for \$3.23 million from National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences

ARC Core faculty member, [Dr. Neeta Thakur](#) is the principal investigator of a team which has earned a five year block of support from the NIEHS. Her

team's project, **Driving Environmental Justice: Community Monitoring of Diesel Truck Emissions and Impacts on Asthma Morbidity in Immigrant Communities**, seek to estimate the short-term health effects of black carbon exposure on daily rescue medication use and symptom burden; understand how acculturative stress and discrimination may modify or enhance this association; identify multilevel protective factors that reduce the health effects of black carbon exposure in asthma; and co-prioritize protective strategies at the individual, household, and community level.



Dr. Neeta Thakur's academic and community partners include UC Berkeley, Lifelong Medical, Central California Asthma Collaborative, and Little Manila Rising. The team will enroll 300 Latine households to participate in capturing detailed rescue medication-use data while creating a sensor network and air quality model to derive an hourly 100-meter black carbon concentration grid.

Dr. Oanh Nguyen appointed chief of ZSFG's Division of Hospital Medicine

As a hospital medicine physician deeply committed to advancing care in safety-net settings and serving historically marginalized communities, ARC Associated Faculty member [Dr. Oanh Nguyen](#) will soon step into the role of chief of the Division of Hospital Medicine at ZSFG.

Announcing Dr. Nguyen's recent appointment, Dr. Neil R. Powe, Chief of Medicine, and Dr. Robert M. Wachter, Department of Medicine Chair wrote: "As a health services researcher steeped in epidemiology and implementation science, Oanh's research seeks to advance health equity by using rigorous methods to evaluate healthcare system innovations. Her work, sponsored by the NIH and private foundations, focuses on care transitions, addressing unmet social needs that affect health, and examining the impact of health policies on access to treatment such as dialysis, inpatient addiction care, and diabetes medications."



Dr. Nguyen also serves as the Co-Director of Academic Development and Scholarship for the Division of Hospital Medicine, Scholarship Coach for UCSF Health's Learning Health Systems initiative, ZSFG Liaison to the UCSF CTSI Participant Recruitment Program, and Deputy Editor of the *Journal of Hospital Medicine*. Dr. Nguyen's appointment is effective November 1, 2024.

Melanie is an Assistant Professor of Emergency Medicine at UCSF and Affiliate Faculty of the Philip R. Lee Institute for Health Policy Studies. She is also the Co-Director of the Social Emergency Medicine and Health Equity Section in the Department of Emergency Medicine and holds a secondary appointment in the Department of Medicine's Division of Clinical Informatics and Digital Transformation.



Melanie works clinically as an emergency physician at Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital and UCSF Medical Center, and as a health services and informatics researcher within the UCSF School of Medicine. Her research focuses on improving comprehensive emergency care for vulnerable populations, specifically leveraging technology to identify and address social needs in the emergency department.

Dr. Molina was born and raised in Austin, TX. She graduated summa cum laude from The University of Texas at Austin with a Bachelor of Science in Biology and a Bachelor of Arts in Hispanic Studies, continuing her medical training at Harvard Medical School and the Harvard Affiliated Emergency Medicine Residency at Mass General Brigham.

Prior to joining UCSF faculty, Dr. Molina completed a postdoctoral fellowship through the National Clinician Scholars Program at UCSF and a Master in Advanced Studies through UCSF's Department of Epidemiology and Biostatistics—these included formal training in research, policy, and advocacy.

Outside of research and clinical work, Dr. Molina stays true to her Austinite roots and enjoys singing, dancing, playing the sax, and going to live music shows.

We hope Melanie's involvement with ARC will offer her many opportunities to enrich her faculty experience and deepen her engagement with a community of action-oriented researchers focused on health equity.
